ATTENTION ALL TAXPAYERS

Metered Utility Bills for the period May to August 2009 have been mailed. If you have not received your bill, please contact the Property Tax Section at 604-591-4181 immediately. All property owners are responsible for payment of utilities, regardless of whether or not a metered utility bill is received. ANNUAL customers do not receive a metered utility bill. NEW OWNERS: You are responsible for payment of the Metered Utility Bill before the due date of November 2, 2009, in order to avoid penalty charges. IF PAYING BY MAIL: Please ensure your payment is postmarked by Canada Post no later than November 2, 2009. A 10% penalty will be added to any metered utility balance remaining unpaid after November 2, 2009. City Hall office hours are 8:30am to 4:30pm, Mon-Fri.

Parks, Trees and Safety

During windstorms the risk of tree failure in parks increases. The City recommends that during windstorm advisory events the public avoid treed park areas due to the potential for trees, or parts of trees, to fall and cause injury to park visitors. To report a potential tree hazard or tree failure on parkland residents are encouraged to call the Parks Service Request line at 604-501-5050.
