## **Preface**

Every five years, Statistics Canada conducts a Census of Population in order to develop a statistical portrait of Canada and its people. The most recent Census was conducted in May 2011.

At the time of the last Census, Statistic Canada replaced the long form Census that collected social and economic data with a voluntary National Household Survey (NHS). The 2011 Census questionnaire consisted of the same eight demographic and linguistic questions that appeared on the 2006 Census short-form questionnaire, with the addition of two questions on language. The content of the new NHS is similar to that of the 2006 Census long questionnaire; however, changes were made to some questions and sections of the questionnaire. For example, in the 2011 NHS changes were made to the questions used to measure Aboriginal identity; a new component of income is measured; and, the universe for determining generation status was expanded to include the entire population.

### Comparability

The Global Non-response Rate (GNR) is used to ascertain the level of non-response to the National Household Survey. Due to the voluntary nature of the survey, the NHS is subject to greater non-response bias.

Change in survey method or content can affect the comparability of the data over time. Statistics Canada states that it is impossible to determine whether, and to what extent, differences in a variable are attributable to change or to non-response bias. As a result, caution must be exercised when NHS estimates are compared with data from the 2006 Census long form.

### Fact Sheet Overview

The community demographic profiles in this series provide a comparison between the current and previous censuses, Surrey and key Metro Vancouver municipalities, as well as between each of Surrey's six communities: Cloverdale, Fleetwood, Guildford, Newton, South Surrey, and Whalley. City Centre is also identified as a sub-community planning area within Whalley.

For the purpose of this and other facts sheets in the series, the term "National Household Survey" (NHS) refers to the National Household Survey of Canada conducted by Statistics Canada. The voluntary survey collected social and economic information about the people of Canada between May and August 2011. The term "Census" in this document refers to the Census of Population conducted by Statistics Canada on May 10, 2011. The Census provides information about the people and housing units in Canada.

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## **FAMILIES**

A census family includes married or common-law couples, with or without children, and lone parents with at least one child. A couple may be of opposite or same sex. Children in a census family include grandchildren living with grandparent(s) but no parents present. Family characteristics reported include marital and common-law status, family size, structure, and living arrangements.

The following table summarizes census family statistics for the City of Surrey in 2011.




### **MARITAL AND COMMON-LAW STATUS**

Married spouse is defined as two persons of opposite or same sex who are legally married to each other and living in the same dwelling. Common-law partners are two persons of opposite or same sex who are not legally married to each other, but live together as a couple in the same dwelling.

In 2011, the majority (55.4%) of Surrey's residents were married (and not separated). Common law comprised the marital status of 5.5% of Surrey residents, while 26.5% were single (never legally married).


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## **Marital Status in Surrey's Communities**


In 2011, Newton had the greatest proportion (58.9%) of married (and not separated) persons of all Surrey communities. Comparatively, City Centre had the lowest proportion of married (and not separated) (37.4%) people of all Surrey communities, as well as the greatest proportion of single (never legally married) persons (34.3%).


## **FAMILY SIZE**

In 2011, there were 131,070 census families in Surrey. The majority of census families consisted of two persons (42.1%). Families of five or more persons comprised 11.0% of census families. The average number of persons per census family was 3.1.


In 2011, the most common number of children for married couples was two children (45.5%). One child was most common number of children for common-law couples (48.1%) and lone parents (58.0%).


# **Family Size in Surrey's Communities**

In Newton (12.6%) and Fleetwood (12.4%), greater than 12% of families consisted of 5 or more persons. Comparatively, in South Surrey, 7.6% of families consisted of 5 or more persons. South Surrey had the greatest proportion of 2 person families (52.4%).



# **Family Size in Metro Vancouver**


In Metro Vancouver, Surrey had the greatest proportion of 5 or more person families (11.0%). Comparatively, across Metro Vancouver, 7.9% of families consisted of 5 or more persons. Surrey had a lower proportion of 2 person (42.1%) and 3 person (22.4%) families compared to the Metro Vancouver region (46.5%; 23.5%)



### **CHILDREN AT HOME**

In Surrey, the number (53,555) of children age 18 and over living at home has increased over the last ten years. Children aged 18 and over now constitute 33.3% of all children living at home in Surrey.


Although the proportion of children under 15 years of age has decrease, the absolute number of children living at home (under 15 years of age) increased by 9,100 over the last five years.

## **Children at Home in Surrey's Communities**


In Surrey, Guildford had the greatest proportion of children 18 years and over living at home (37.1%). Comparatively in Cloverdale, 26.7% of children aged 18 years and over were living at home. Cloverdale had the greatest proportion of children 14 years of age and younger (62.4%), while Guildford had the lowest proportion of children age 14 years and younger (50.6%).

### **SENIORS' LIVING ARRANGEMENTS**


In Surrey, the seniors population increased by 10,000 people between 2006 and 2011. During this period, the number of seniors living in families increased by 8,050.

# Seniors' Living Arrangement in Surrey's Communities

In all Surrey communities, the majority of seniors live in families. South Surrey had the greatest proportion of seniors living alone (24.3%), as well as the lowest proportion of seniors living with relatives (3.1%). Comparatively, in Fleetwood 12.6% of seniors lived with relatives, and 15.7% lived alone.
