Jurors' Statement

This exhibition was developed as a companion exhibition for the *Fiction non Fiction* exhibition.

Over sixty images were submitted for consideration for this exhibition. The process of selection included an overall review for

- Technical ability
- Expression of intellectual content or issues within the image
- Innovation
- Responsiveness to the theme of the project

The final selection of works in this exhibition offer a sample of the many possibilities and tools used in contemporary photography. Viewers will notice the increasing use of digital cameras and evidence of software manipulating images, the ability to print on surfaces other than paper, as well as the continued use of manual cameras and traditional printing methods. Whether artists are interested in radically altering or presenting images, or are invested in documentation, photography offers an ever-expanding arena for creative expression. Photography has always been powerful – photos persuade us to see the world around us in new or even profound ways. Artists also use photography poetically to express their thoughts and ideas in metaphors and images that are particular to their experience or worldview.

We chose these 36 works from over 60 submissions. Our criteria for selection included technical merit, originality, clarity of expression, intent and innovation as well as presentation.

We sincerely thank all of the artists who offered their work for this exhibition, and would like to thank the volunteers who made this opportunity for artists possible.

Placing Artists

1st Place

Stuart McCall *Oyster Ontology*

Frequently making use of unconventional perspective and scale, I offer the viewer a fresh look at the familiar imagery from nature and industry in order to challenge preconceived notions about our surroundings... and perhaps even ourselves. By enlarging the oyster shell to five times its original size, we notice astonishing detail and intricacy. In concert with the natural convulsions of the shell's outer surface, tiny barnacles and limpet shells create contours and subtle colours that bring to mind the landscape of miniature Japanese garden.



2nd Place

Margaret Brezden *Simplicity*

My photography has helped me visualize a small part of my heritage and has enabled me to perpetuate a life style that few of us would have endured. After seeing Jill Enfield's hand-coloured images I knew that by using her hand-coloring technique with my heritage images it would give them a look of aged beauty that a regular coloured image would never convey to the viewer. My other passion is viewing things from a different perspective, moving in close to my subject in order to show the intricate design and form that we normally don't notice.

Leslie Stanick *Landscapes of the Heart*

This image reflects the delicate transparency of the heart in the process of awakening; deep joy and gratitude emanating in waves of gentleness and grace.
