ARTISTS' STATEMENTS CATEGORY 1: PAINTING

Chenxi Zhan – yaNoki

The work "yaNoki" aims to express my curiosity and concern about the act of people collecting soft toys. By painting these toys, I try to incorporate the emotions of the interviewees into my creations to reflect the particularity of these objects.

Donna Schipfel – Look at Me

This painting was created by letting my imagination flow with the ink, allowing me to see a garden of irises, bright and beautiful, saying "look at me"

Giulia Levrini – Togetherness

A physical object, the same colour tuque, attracted my attention to the invisible connection between a mother and a daughter. A link that highlighted how similar they are in many ways while unique in many others. Letting the black ink freely flow and interact with water and paper, I wanted to bring attention more to the running connections rather than the original fluo pink of the hat.

Ramona lanchici – Serenity at Sea

Inspired by one tone and only a couple of colours. This piece represents the tranquility and serenity when it was created. Peaceful sailing cradled by light winds.

Susan Pellaers – Organic Snack

Exploring human relationships, either with oneself; with other people/animals; or with one's envirnoment, is the cornerstone of my visual artistic expression. The juicy berry growing in the wild has an ancient pull on our modern-day psyche, causing the innate impluse rooted in our "hunter/gatherer" past to resurface.

Zarin Tazreen – *Deep Cove Blues*

Deep Cove Blues was painted on location (en 'plein air') near the shores of Deep Cove, North Vancouver. As an artist, I am captivated by the magic of atmospheric perspective, a technique that captures the interplay of light and atmosphere to create depth and distance in my artworks.

Marika Morissette – *Misty Waters*

Delight in the misty ambiance as a large ship passes through the harbour at sunset. Don't stand too close or the fine spray hanging in the air might leave you drenched!

ARTISTS' STATEMENTS

CATEGORY 2: DRAWING, MIXED MEDIA, AND PRINTMAKING

Elaine Krieger – Long Eared Owl – On Alert

An elusive creature, which hides in bramble and branches, stretched out, on alert as a raptor passes by. Patina gold leaf on mixed media paper, use with acrylic paint shows this image with a glistening effect.

Wendy Mould – Rocky Shores of Hicks Lake

Rocks. I find I have a fascination with them. They represent strength, resilience and yes, a sense of beauty. I love the contrast of their sharp, hard, gray surface with the soft, fluttery, green leaves on the branches that grow amongst them. The pair seem to have a bond of friendship, sharing the space, and sharing the struggles of life together. The rocks and bushes are found on the shoreline of Hicks Lake. A favourite place for me to visit over the years with my family. Lots of memories buried in their crevices.

Gyan Gawander – *Dinosaur with Glasses*

This artwork showcases a dinosaur eating popcorn in the theatre.

Jenny Jia – *The Persistence*

By peeling back the layers of time and processes, we can see visually the effect that having extra time can make. Time, after all, is the singular most valuable thing in our lives.

ARTISTS' STATEMENTS CATEGORY 3: SCUI PTURE AND FIBRE ARTS

Ewa Brzezinski – Remnants (3)

This piece of art is the reflection of my life journey. As memories come to life, they are transformed through photographs into physical pieces. To show the journey of recollection to the creation of objects, I started from scratch and developed my own techniques.

Vladimira Fillion-Wackenreuther - Silence

Warp: cotton seine twine (12 ends per inch) and silk (6 ends per inch),

Weft: hand-dyed wool and silk, cotton.

Emily Rektor – *Creation*

Creation references Michelangelo's *Creation of Adam* in the composition of the two robot arms and the posture of the plaster hand. The juxtaposition between the organic quality of the lower arm and the unrefined finish on the upper arm is an inversion on the narrative in the original painting. Along with the robotic nature of the arms, this inversion is meant to cause the viewer to apply the conversation of creation to the modern world.

Jennifer Russell - Red Robins

These birds were made in memory of my father, Robin, who suddenly passed away last year. He enjoyed bringing me and my sisters to Red Robins and pretending it was his restaurant.

ARTISTS' STATEMENTS CATEGORY 4: PHOTOGRAPHY

Linda Bickerton-Ross – Small City Blues

Slipped out of a gallery into drenching rain, dove into my car to peer through a ravaged windshield, illuminating an electric scene. Grabbed my phone to snap this small study in blue.

Fang Tong – Park

The photo looks at the human psychological tendency to follow or copy one another. It's very subtle and I think it's a fascinating thing to observe. Usually we think we're in control of our thoughts and behaviour but that isn't always the case.

Clare Palmer – *Pesuta Shipwreck*

This ship ran aground during a violent storm in Haida Gwaii in 1928. It was extraordinary to be able to hike out to the site on East Beach in Naikoon Provincial Park to experience it.

Jonathan Lee – The Farm House

My work is primarily about the intersection of memory and place. The locations of one's past are a trigger for nostalgia, and I seek to capture the kinds of objects and places that allow us experience memories in this highly subjective way.

CATEGORY 5: DIGITAL, PERFORMATIVE, AND NEW MEDIA ART

Pari – passengers in east vancouver | Komagata Maru series
This work invites collective (re)memories of the Komagata Maru incident,
by spawning visuals from AI language modeling apps. Through curated
prompts, the artist contemplates questions like: How do we negotiate our
identities in the face of being othered? How do 'others' navigate through
spaces that aren't necessarily made with them in mind? How can they
establish a path back to belonging in these spaces?

Monica Cheema – Paldi, A Place Like This

On the east coast of Vancouver Island sits a tiny town with an over-100 year history of intercultural labour work. The original landmarks of train tracks, bunker homes, and the mill for which the town was best known no longer exist, but one Gurdwara still stands. This Gurdwara is unique not only for the fact that it exists in a ghost town, but also because it functions as a community archive. This short film seeks to document the Paldi we see today, by remembering the Paldi that once was. A site of resilience, joy and new beginnings.

Ed Park – Forget that other stuff, 'cause this is the good stuff
Before people started turning to substances to get their high, the
wonders of the natural world including the stars were the original way
people got mind blown. It's time we get back to that.

JURORS' STATEMENT

It was with great pleasure, enthusiasm, and a privilege that the three of us were asked to judge this year's entries to the *ARTS 2023* show. The many pieces of work span a variety of style, themes, processes, and mediums. It is wonderful to see an abundance of talent. Our criteria for selection was simple: the works had to speak to us, the works had to convey a sense of purpose and the works had to show a level of maturity that deemed it place in the *ARTS 2023* show. As jurors, we had our work cut out for us, and the decision-making was tough. We decided, due to the quality of the works, it would be fairer for multiple pieces to receive a joint prize recognition in the painting category.

We hope the public will view this show with reverence and that they leave knowing the arts are alive and growing.
