





From the intimacy of a quiet inhalation to the distance between continents, this exhibition brings together large-scale metal and mixed media sculptures along with immersive and participatory multichannel audio installations.

Tapping into the fecundity of the Black diasporic imagination, Campbell reconstructs and reinvents lost connections, lamenting the violent disruptions of the past while constructing a home for Black communities' strength of being.

Central to the exhibition is Black Breath Archive, an installation of breath recordings from Surrey and other Lower Mainland residents. Campbell strips away racial hierarchies and holds up Black breath as its own force—a carrier of ancestry and experience, a creator of community and something that, even in its most subtle presentation, changes the way we think, feel, and live.

Other artworks that address breath and breathing are the series Black Breath Archive Portraits, Maroonscape 3: Finding Accompong, and Breath Cycle. Breath Cycle gestures towards a deeper past, connecting the oxygen we breathe to its production in symbiotic, multispecies communities of ancient lichen. The five-metre tall Maroonscape 3: Finding Accompong derives its shape from the bronchial structure of a human lung as well as the forked shapes of slave yokes.

Both these works nod to fractal geometry and binary counting systems that originated in Africa.

These works are inspired, in part, by sites and histories of Jamaican anti-colonial resistance and slave rebellion. Similarly pointing to the pasts and potential futures is a sprawling new sculpture Ghost Islands/Mid-Atlantic Refugia that imagines the journey towards Black liberation in the form of an undulating, curved surface inspired by the Atlantic ocean's deep-sea topography.

"Livity" is a Rastafarian word that can either mean way of life or the life force present in every living thing. The artworks in An Ocean to Livity evoke a sense of journey, worldly interconnectedness, and communal struggle against the injustices of times past and present, geographies far and near.

Charles Campbell is a multidisciplinary artist, writer, and curator who lives and works on lakwanan territory, Victoria, BC. Campbell was the recipient of the 2022 VIVA Award from the Jack and Doris Shadbolt Foundation.

Experience the fusion of dance, poetry, and music in this residency that brings together three South Asian artists from Enable: Art Society, a non-profit collective dedicated to uplifting art projects by emerging and marginalized voices, in partnership with 5X.

The word "masi" means aunt In Punjabi, Hindi, Gujarati, and other South Asian dialects. Masi Medicine honours the masis in the artists' own lives. Regardless of blood ties, masis have been instrumental in cultivating communal wellbeing and providing sisterhood.

Poets Franz Seachel and Anjalica Solomon, along with dancer Alyssa Marshi, delve into identity, nourishment through play, and centring joy during the course of their residency. Their sensory journey will feature digital projections of the artists' work in development through poetry and movement, accompanied by soundscapes that invite audiences to slow down, breathe, and move with intention. The exhibition will encourage visitors to reflect on nourishment and joy.

This residency culminates in 5X's annual art party happening this year on June 18 at the Gallery. The festival elevates South Asian culture by covering music, visual art, and fashion. Originally starting out as the Vancouver International Bhangra Celebration Society (VIBC) in 2004, they have hosted a multitude of initiatives and events supporting South Asian artists over the years.

Art by Surrey Secondary Students: Connected

Talented young artists throughout the Surrey School district showcase new paintings, drawings, photographs, digital media, and more that examine contemporary experiences and ideas while demonstrating exceptional visual literacy and technical skill. This year's edition is also the first to include ceramics, with excellent examples of tea sets, planters, and sculptures. The work on display demonstrates a maturity and a keen awareness of many of the challenges facing our world, including the ongoing protests in Iran, violence against women, impossible beauty standards, and climate change.

Cindy Mochizuki: Autumn Strawberry In the summer of 2021, the Gallery presented Cindy Mochizuki's multimedia installation Autumn Strawberry. Set inside this installation, performers worked with Mochizuki and choreographer Lisa Mariko Gelley on a performance that portrays the stories related to the history of berry farming by Japanese settler families in the pre-WWII era across the Fraser Valley. These performers (all descendants of those connected to Japanese Canadian berry farming industries) acted in front of the camera, repeating a score of gestures derived from the installation animations.

ARTS 2023

A long-standing collaboration between the Arts Council of Surrey and the Gallery, the annual ARTS exhibition is a celebration of artmaking from across the Lower Mainland. Every year, local artists are invited to submit their works for adjudication by a panel of art experts. Selected artworks are shown at the Gallery, with some works recognized for outstanding achievement in five different categories: 1) painting; 2) drawing, mixed-media, and printmaking on paper; 3) sculptures and fibre art; 4) photography; and 5) digital, performative, and new media art. Visitors to the Gallery are also invited to select a work for the People's Choice award.

ONGOING

Sandeep Johal: It's not what you look at that matters, it's what you see Inspired by Indian folk art, Johal combines black and white line work with colourful shapes and patterns to tell stories and lessons through the eyes of animals such as birds, tigers, and monkeys. Like the title (a quote from philosopher Henry David Thoreau), this mural encourages visitors to slow down and observe what they see around them. The artwork invites imaginations to run wild and for visitors to think without boundaries, create without judgment, and play without rules. This artwork can be seen on the outside of the lower windows of the Gallery classrooms.

JUN 24-SEP 3

Diane Roy: The Deep and the Shallows

Imaginative and technically innovative, Diane Roy's textile objects and images have developed a unique formal language over the past four decades. Her work often draws inspiration from coastal tidal zones and ecology of the Salish Sea, with sculptures evoking the shapes and latticework forms of corals, sea anemone, urchins, and shells. Roy's newest piece, the large-scale tapestry Through the Eye of the Whale, continues her work with synthetic found textiles on a new monumental scale. Fusing art, science, and mythology, Roy's art reminds us of the wonders of the biodiversity around us. The Deep and the Shallows presents the largest retrospective of this artist's work to date. Born and raised in Quebec and based in Surrey since the early 1980s, Roy has developed a unique voice over the course of her fibre-based sculpture practice.

JUN 24-SEP 3

Invisible Fish

Primarily showcasing works from Salish artists early in their careers, this exhibition borrows its title from a Joy Harjo poem that speaks to the spirit of this group show—familial and community connections centred around waterways and how our environment holds collective memory. Reflecting on where the Gallery is situated in Bear Creek Park on Coast Salish territory, Invisible Fish encourages visitors to think of their own relationship to the creeks, rivers, and sea that flow through and around this land. From Roxanne Charles's installation **ŚKE,KÁL / Microphone** created with community at Semiahmoo, to Susan Point's print The River Woven by Time referencing Salish weaving patterns, this exhibition also draws from the Gallery's permanent collection. With the inclusion of a two and a half-metre touchable block print and a friendly reading nook for all ages, Invisible Fish invites visitors to experience the exhibition in tactile ways.

The window mural at the entrance to Surrey Arts Centre celebrates the cultural importance of Coast Salish mountain goat horn bracelets and the significance the animal has to the people from this territory. 

Farheen HaQ's installation *Revelation #2* consists of a digital video surrounded by stacked bricks. For the artist, bricks are like the component parts of a language.

Bricks can form into sentences, and by extension, ideas, like the building blocks of built structures. Derived from land and "fired with energy and thought," groupings of bricks can become a "stand-in for worldviews," HaQ says. In the same way that bricks can be firmly set into place, so too can worldviews—be they individual or institutional.

At the centre of HaQ's video image is pulverized brick shaped into the Arabic word iqra, which refers to the first word revealed to the prophet Mohammed. The artist reimagines this Quranic story and places her own hands as the subject who receives and buries the word. The notion of iqra as a revelation asks the receiver to read, to gain knowledge. Yet the artist wonders, "How and what do I get to read? Who gets the revelation?"

In addition to referring to the power of the land, this installation is also about spirit, home, and the structures we build and take apart. The crushed brick references blown-up buildings and ancient holy sites. Through repeating the act of burying and revealing the word, the artist symbolizes her own vacillating views on her faith.

The Gallery presented **Revelation #2** by Farheen HaQ as part of the group exhibition **Ground Signals** in 2017. It was acquired into the Gallery's permanent collection in 2020. Farheen HaQ was born and raised in the Niagara Region of southern Ontario. She now makes her home on lek **eŋen territory, Victoria, BC, where she has lived for the past twenty years.

The Gallery offers a range of ongoing programs, from K–12 school programs (see surrey.ca/galleryeducation) to group tours and workshops, Art Takeout courses, seniors programming, and so much more. Read some highlights below.

This summer, artist Ovila Mailhot lends his talents to design a graphic poster unique to the group exhibition *Invisible Fish*. Often behind-the-scenes work, exhibition posters visually tell a story of the themes and messages behind a show. Curator Alanna Edwards chats with Mailhot about his process.

Invisible Fish touches on the importance of water and familial connections. Being Nlaka'pamux and Stó:lō, how do you understand your relationship to waterways?

The Fraser River is sacred to our people. Teachings are passed down from each generation about how we are all connected to the land and that water is life. The river has connected our Nations together and sustained livelihoods through generations. The importance of these waterways, traditions, and teachings can often be seen in my designs.

With your work in schools sharing about Salish art, how important is it to give back and connect to community?

My work with Connected North [an organization providing live, interactive virtual learning experiences for remote Indigenous classrooms] has allowed me to share with students from many communities across Canada. It's important for me to give back and not only share the beauty of Coast Salish art and my culture, but also to inspire our young students in wanting to learn more or be curious about their own culture, history, or ancestral art forms from their territory.

Having your designs on clothing, as well as being involved with public art, what is next for you and what do you hope to accomplish?

I'm constantly working on honing my skills and personal growth as an artist and am always looking for different possibilities and opportunities. I'm set on continuing this wave that I've been riding with my art. I'm also working towards expanding and growing my own brand, Salish Son Design. I find myself juggling a lot of different things with my art and design, and that's exactly where I want to be right now in my career.



Jen is an artist whose primary work is painting, investigating themes of the natural world—florals, nature, abstraction—while inviting us to think more deeply about what it means to truly be human.

Can you share with us one practice that sustains you?

Going into nature and listening to music. I really like walking down to the beach or into the forest. The patterns, light, sounds, and smells—it's all very inspiring.

Inspiration is nuanced, complex, and deeply personal. What two things inspire you lately?

The creative community around me. How people approach their work, their process, is a beautiful thing to watch unfold and their dedication pushes me to keep going. I'm also inspired by the idea of working on a large scale right now. After having finished some murals, I've overcome a lot of my fear around it. I've been thinking about not only murals but public spaces that murals live in and how that space can be part of a conversation with the art. I am excited about what's to come with that.

Finally, what three things are you learning right now?

Don't get distracted—stay focused. For me this means being aware of many things throughout my days that could possibly take me away from my work. **Manage my energy**—I have a finite amount of energy each day so I have to decide, very clearly, who or what gets that energy.

Surrender to the chaos—Life can be full; things can come up that are unexpected, chaotic, or difficult. When things get challenging, I try to move with the changes and learn from them instead of trying to control them.
