## A. DELEGATIONS

1. Richard Bodnark, Surrey Firefighters

The delegation presented Council with a cheque on behalf of the Surrey Firefighters Charitable Society to support City youth-based programs and initiatives.

2. Hugh Carter, Chair Urban Development Institute's Fraser Valley Committee File: 0250-20

The delegation provided a PowerPoint presentation outlining key priorities for the development industry and opportunities to address housing challenges in Surrey and highlighted the following information:

- Development generates an estimated \$23 billion in provincial economic outputs through job creation in sales, marketing, construction, interior design, operations and maintenance, as well as taxation.
- There are new challenges to address in the development industry due to changing contexts such as the mortgage stress test, decreasing housing prices, rising interest rates and the school tax. These challenges impact development carrying costs and make it difficult to provide affordable housing options.
- Most new projects follow the same basic development process that consists
  of numerous steps. Development is a high-risk industry with high-upfront
  costs, so builders require certainty for projects to succeed. Even slight
  changes in construction or purchase prices will negatively impact already
  small profit margins.
- Local governments have numerous tools that impact the creation of new housing, such as zoning, Development Cost Charges, permitting approval

and property taxes. Increases in local development costs will impact housing affordability.

• The UDI continues to work with the City in numerous areas, such as processing time, transit-oriented development, addressing community concerns, affordable housing, community engagement and building community amenities and infrastructure.
