2. Penny Bradley, Executive Director, Alexandra Neighbourhood House, Michelle Shaw, Pacific Community Resources Society and Cody Jacques, Youth Perspective

The delegation provided a PowerPoint overview of the Surrey White Rock Integrated Youth Collaborative (SWRIYC) and its goals for youth and their families to access critically needed services and highlighted the following information:

- The SWRIYC is a multi-partner table that was created to develop a network of like-minded people and community allies with a primary focus to establish easy access for youth and their families to integrated and coordinated services. table with multiple partners, including the City of Surrey. Services include mental health and substance use, primary health care, counselling, life skills development, housing and LGBTQ2+ friendly services.
- The SWRIYC is currently preparing for a Foundry proposal call. A Foundry is a comprehensive, integrated service centre for youth aged 12-24. As a space where service provides are brought together, a Foundry operates with a "no wrong door" policy. Surrey is currently the largest city in BC that does not have a Foundry.
- A Surrey/White Rock Foundry will have specific service considerations to address, such as the large geographic area, the complex service system for youth mental health, the current reorganization of primary care and the significant populations of Indigenous and newcomer youth. To address some of these issues, the SWRIYC is considering submitting two Foundry applications, as well as implementing a mobile service unit.

1. Sue McIntosh, Executive Director Seniors Come Share Society

The delegation provided an overview regarding the services provided by Seniors Come Share Society and highlighted the following information:

- Seniors Come Share Society provides services, programs and resources for older adults and their families. 26 programs are provided with support from over 100 volunteers. An annual service guide is available in hard-copy and online.
- The Day Program for Older Adults provides specialized care for individuals who want to stay in their homes but have health-related issues. The program is offered in Newton, South Surrey and Guildford and provides socialization for the older adult and respite for caregivers.
- Community meal programs are offered at recreation centres throughout the city. Seniors can enjoy a meal, socialize and learn about services and programs.
