E. INFORMATION ITEMS

1. The City Manager reviewed the Memorandum from the Crime Reduction Strategy Manager entitled "Information about Doda and Afeem".

Doda or Efeem are illegal opiate based substances which are made from a poppy plant which is being sold through paan (snack) shops along with illegal tobacco, prescription medications and other products. There are currently 6 shops operating in Surrey.

The use of doda and afeem has been prevalent in South Asian countries for decades. It is ingested as tea or a snack made with nuts, herbs and various spices and rolled in a betal leaf. Doda is predominately used by older South Asian men and is often steeped in tea. The younger men's tendency is toward afeem, predominately in the blue collar professions such as taxi or truck drivers and construction workers.

Both substances are highly addictive and have many side-effects and users display withdrawal symptoms as soon as 6 to 8 hours after ingestion with the worst symptoms occurring in 2 to 3 days after use.

The Surrey RCMP identified the issue a year ago and teamed up with the Provincial Tobacco Enforcement Team to address the issue. More recently, a broader based partnership has been established and includes the Surrey RCMP, City Departments, the Provincial Tobacco Enforcement Unit and Canada Revenue Agency. This group is working on other enforcement strategies such as business license revocation. They have also instigated an Educational brochure and fact sheet which is being distributed and is currently being translated into Punjabi. An educational/marketing plan has been developed to launch this fall to conduct specific outreach to South Asian-serving agencies.
