B. DELEGATIONS - PRESENTATIONS

1. Fire Chief Len Garis

Neighbourhood Emergency Preparedness Program

File: 0550-20-10; 7130-06

Councillor Watts on behalf of the Public Safety Committee commented on the excellent Neighbourhood Emergency Preparedness Program initiated by the City of Surrey and introduced Fire Chief Len Garis.

Chief Garis introduced other members of the Neighbourhood Emergency Preparedness Program who were in the audience and reviewed the history of the program.

Chief Garis advised that the Neighbourhood Emergency Preparedness Program teaches skills to residents so that in a major emergency they are capable of taking care of themselves during the first 72 hours of a major emergency.

Steve Robinson introduced the members of the Neighbourhood Emergency Preparedness Team who were in the audience and presented a visual overview of the program.

Mr. Robinson advised that the program teaches skills which can be used in any emergency, including day-to-day emergencies such as car accidents. He noted that neighbourhoods are broken up into 7 skill areas to cover all aspects of an emergency, such as fire fighting and medical.

Mr. Robinson noted that during 2002 they plan to train a further 4000 people, and 15 neighbourhood teams, which will include ongoing skills maintenance for existing teams.

The Mayor thanked the members of the Neighbourhood Emergency Preparedness Team and complimented them on the work that has been done.

Councillor Watts presented certificates to members of the team and expressed appreciation for the work that they have done.

Councillor Watts advised that anyone who wishes to volunteer can call Joclyn at 543-6795.

PROPOSAL:

To rezone the above noted properties from "One-Acre

Residential Zone (RA)" to "Single Family Residential Coach House Zone (RF-12C)" as shown as Block A. Block

B and Block C (existing RA Zone) are shown to indicate

areas for future development.

The purpose of the rezoning is to permit the development of approximately 142 small single family residential lots in East Clayton, where the homes may have coach houses or secondary suites.

DEVELOPMENT VARIANCE PERMIT

To vary "Surrey Zoning By-law, 1993, No. 12000" Part 17Ai (RF-12C), Sub-section H.1, as follows:

(a) To vary the requirement for a driveway only from a rear lane for proposed Lots 70 to 77 and 79 to 96, in order to permit development to these lots either from the fronting street or a rear lane.

The Notice of the Public Hearing, except the legal description, was read by the Acting City Clerk. The location of the properties was indicated to the Public Hearing.

The Mayor advised that Karen Kersey and Patrick Condom had indicated in writing their support/opposition to the proposed rezoning.

Rex Eaton, 7014 - 188 Street, was present to comment on the proposed rezoning and presented Council with written information.

Mr. Eaton continued that he supports the concept of coach houses, but would like to see proper egress out of the property to ensure that 70 Avenue does not become a major arterial through the development. He expressed concern that adequate park space may not have been provided and he hoped that provision of park space meets City criteria.

Mr. Eaton continued that there should be adequate buffering for the existing properties so that their privacy is protected and will not affected by headlights during the night. He noted that they would also like to see a fence erected along the back property line to preserve their safety and security.

Mr. Eaton commented that they have been made aware that a commercial centre may be placed to the north, and expressed concern with the impact that a commercial centre would have on the area.

Mr. Eaton concluded by expressing concern for how 188 Street will look during the period of construction and that the community should not have to deal with this over an extended period of time.

<u>Karen Kersey, 6768 – 196 Street</u>, was present to comment on the proposed rezoning. She commented on a recent court case, and that as a result homes were allowed to tie into the Township of Langley sewer system.

Ms. Kersey advised that she feels the plan will impact on residents in the Township of Langley and noted a potential impact on the aquifer. She commented that if the area is to be sustainable, the City of Surrey should not be relying on piped in solutions.

Ms. Kersey concluded by asking Council to rethink the rezoning and submitted written information.

<u>Mike McLennan 19120 – 68 Avenue</u>, was present to comment on the proposed rezoning and stated that there was some land clearing that took place in the area, and a question with the issuance of a burning permit. He also commented on taxes, revenues to the City, and pedestrian safety.

Mr. McLennan expressed concern for his children who travel the 192 Street corridor, which is presently at 5,000 vehicles per day. He advised that he has been told that upgrading of the road and provision of sidewalks will not be done until capacity is at 20,000 vehicles per day.

Mr. McLennan commented that the development will exacerbate the current unsafe conditions on 188 Street and on 192 Street. He stated that the time to address these conditions is before the development proceeds.

Mr. McLennan stated that he has not had time to review the application prior to this evening and feels that the information was not made available to him. He concluded by asking Council to address the issue of pedestrian safety.

<u>Patrick Condon 2238 Collingwood Street Vancouver</u>, was present to comment on the proposed rezoning and stated that he is speaking in favour of the development as a member of the UBC Liveable Environment.

Mr. Condon advised that it has been his pleasure to work with representatives of the City and with BFW Developments, and complimented them on the work they have done in creating a new model community. Mr. Condon encouraged Council to continue to support sustainable developments and review the development cost charge structure to find ways to reward sustainable developments.

<u>Neil Unwood 7076 – 188 Street</u>, was present to comment on the proposed rezoning and stated that he is concerned with ground water. He expressed concerned that the development would result in excess water on his property further limiting the per capacity of his septic field.

Mr. Unwood stated that he does support the concept for the area.

<u>Dawn Lund 19039 - 68 Avenue</u> was present to comment on the proposed rezoning and expressed concern for the existing condition of the area and for the groundwater.

<u>John Turner, Project Manager, BFW Development</u> was present to comment on the proposed rezoning and stated that information was left for McLennan at their front counter, but it was not picked up.

Mr. Turner noted that there is a piece of property designated as part of the livework area, but they are having some difficulty determining a land use designation which will be financially viable for that area. In the meantime the land has been put to good use by having cattle brought in to farm.

Mr. Turner stated that he will be dealing with the concerns expressed by Mr. Eton and the other owners to mitigate impact on their properties.

Mr. Turner noted that they will not be trucking any top soil out of the area, but hope to add to the top soil to improve the sponge for the area and the capability of handling excess water. He commented that each property will be capable of handling its own excess water, with any overflow going into the storm sewer.

- 3. Changes to the NCP drainage schemes can be considered, provided they are as functional, effective, safe, environmentally sound, and provide a similar level of community amenity as the original proposed scheme.
- 4. All additional costs of alternate drainage schemes (such as the extra cost for new storm sewer alignments, additional detention ponds, etc.,) must be funded by the initial developer who may choose to recover the extra cost through an area charge, provided the land owners give appropriate support to the initiative (i.e., Development Works Agreement).
