He noted that the landscape has been an issue in the past and brought two proposals from the architect and landscape architect, noting that the Engineering Department did not support the proposed landscaping as it would reduce the driveway entrance.

The Planner reported that a Temporary Use Permit was issued last year, at which point the Applicant was asked to install landscape islands. The new Temporary Use Permit is to add the addition of car rental, to which the Planning and Development Department is taking that opportunity to improve the landscaping. The City is confident that the landscaping can be increased.

Kamaljit Heer, owner of the property, stated that she will take better care of the property and make sure it is clean and neat.

The Agent further noted that the property at the back of the building is owned by BC Hydro and is the most troublesome property in the neighbourhood (e.g. the bushes are frequented by prostitutes, etc.), and that property must be cleaned as well.

The Mayor commented that a letter will be sent to BC Hydro, from the City, requesting that their property be cleaned up and looked after.

- WHEREAS the problem of boyhood sexual exploitation is often overlooked, neglected and poorly understood; and
- WHEREAS while efforts to protect female children from sexual victimization and rehabilitative services provided to those who are traumatized are underway, collectively applying these same efforts on behalf of male children has lagged; and
- WHEREAS boys who are sexually abused usually lack appropriate adult male role models and mentors to assist them in their recovery, provide support during any prosecution, and advocate on their behalf with other adults and organizations, and as a result sustain additional trauma and suffer developmentally; and
- WHEREAS it is encouraged that all adult survivors provide appropriate nurturing, support and guidance to sexual abuse victims as they are able; and
- WHEREAS all adult survivors advocate for the prevention of childhood sexual abuse and for the development of effective and comprehensive recovery and rehabilitative programs for victims within the limits of his or her governmental and cultural restrictions and to the extent he or she is able;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that I, Dianne L. Watts, do hereby declare the month of April, 2009 as "MALE SURVIVORS OF SEXUAL ABUSE AWARENESS MONTH" in the City of Surrey.

(c) WORLD AUTISM AWARENESS DAY April 2, 2009

- WHEREAS autism is a lifelong developmental disability that manifests itself during the first three years of life and results from a neurological disorder that affects the functioning of the brain, mostly affecting children irrespective of gender, race or socio-economic status, and is characterized by impairments in social interaction, problems with verbal and non-verbal communication and restricted, repetitive behaviour, interests and activities; and
- WHEREAS more than 1 in 150 children will be diagnosed in British Columbia;
- WHEREAS autism is the fastest growing serious developmental disability in the world; and

- WHEREAS there is no medical cure for detection or cure for autism, early diagnosis and intervention improves outcomes; and
- WHEREAS the prevalence of autism has increased tenfold in the last decade; and

WHEREAS people with autism frequently become frustrated, isolated, and depressed because of their communication difficulties, and it is the inability to connect with others that is often the most difficult part of living with autism; and

- WHEREAS the Canucks Autism Network delivers high calibre programs and services to the children, families and communities dealing with the affects of autism, and by encouraging friendship, understanding and social responsibility through the creation of mentoring and friendship opportunities, and in support of the designation by the resolution adopted by the General Assembly of the United Nations, has set that April 2nd, shall be designated as World Autism Awareness Day;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that I, Dianne L. Watts, do hereby declare April 2, 2009 as "WORLD AUTISM AWARENESS DAY" in the City of Surrey.

- The Port Committee appointed Helen Sparks for a 2 year term. This new committee will go through a review process for appointment to the Committee in future.
- Environment and Energy Committee has established a rebate for wood stoves. The \$250 rebate is funded through the BC Lung Association.
- The Canadian Urban Institute partnered with the government in Sweden for tours on waste to energy plants. Councillor Hunt chairs the Waste Committee, this delegation is an educational tour for about 30 Canadians across the country and Metro Vancouver is sending 3 delegates, including Councillor Hepner.
- The Mayor suggested that there be a presentation on the waste to energy programs once Councillor Hepner returns from the tour.

Councillor Hunt provided further information with regard to the above and the processes currently going on at Metro Vancouver, which include:

- 1. a public process regarding waste export;
- 2. the Zero Waste Challenge that will identify how far our citizens are willing to go in this process, to be followed by more public information sessions; and
- 3. a consultant report forthcoming on waste to energy versus landfilling and the resulting realities, which will also go to a public process,

all three of which will be done by the summer, condensed into one plan and proceed to consultation by fall.
