- This amendment will allow a temporary truck parking facility for a period not to exceed two years.

The Notice of the Public Hearing was read by the City Clerk. The location of the property was indicated to the Public Hearing.

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<u>Ang Lai, 11769 River Road, Surrey</u>, was in attendance to submit a petition containing 113 signatures, including his, in opposition to this by-law. Mr. Lai provided the following comments against By-laws 16945 and 16946:

- There have been up to 80 trucks operating at the site 24/7, within 50 feet from Mr. Lai's property.
- Trucks start their engines as early as 4:00 a.m. and leave the trucks idling for 15 minutes or longer.
- There are serious health implications from diesel fumes such as asthma, cancer, heart attack, stroke and other diseases.
- The smell of diesel is predominant at all times and there is a constant amount of dust that blows up from the site.
- Three years ago Mr. and Mrs. Lai developed asthma which requires them now to have take medication regularly.
- Residential owners in the neighbourhood agree that the 7m buffer between the residential and industrial properties is insufficient. The trucks are too close to residents.

Mr. Lai suggested the City acquire the lot behind them for green space, connecting a trail at River Road, noting that it would act much better as a buffer between residential and the section where the industry is.

A map was shown noting the sawmill and where the trees that used to act as a buffer have been removed.

<u>Ian Thompson, #48 – 11860 River Road, Surrey</u>, was in attendance to speak, as President of the 50-unit strata complex, in opposition of By-laws 16945 and 16946. Comments were as follows:

- The owners of these properties have not been good corporate citizens.
- As there is no paving on the site, there is sand and dirt everywhere.
- There is noise at all hours.
- Trees have been taken down without leaving enough green space between residential and themselves; a 7m buffer is not wide enough.
- The diesel fumes are very strong.
- The sites are not clean at all. The sidewalks are untidy and there is garbage laying all over.
- It is requested that if the By-laws are not denied, then there should be consideration given to developing the greenbelt, reducing hours of operation of the trucks and that the sites be kept tidy.

<u>Alvaro Benitez, 10020 – 117 Street, Surrey</u>, provided the following comments in opposition to By-laws 16945 and 16946:

- There has been a problem for a long time with these sites.
- There have been prostitutes in the trailers. Pollution and oil coming off the sites in to ditches, rats, dumping grounds, etc. It is an inexcusable use of land.
- In excess of 80 or 90 trucks have been counted at various times, including parking on the road when the lot is full.
- It is the wrong place for truck parking as there are too many residential properties without sufficient buffering.

It was noted that all the above comments will also be put to Item B.5.

Basharat Uzma, 11761 River Road, Surrey, provided the following comments in opposition to By-law 16946:

- Mr. Uzma is forced to wake up at 4:30 a.m. due to the noise of the trucks and them idling for 15 minutes before they leave the site. I am mentally tired from the endless short nights of sleep.
- There is a smell of diesel from Mr. Uzma's backyard where his children play; diesel fumes can cause serious health implications.
- The police and by-law enforcement have been called on numerous occasions.

<u>Avtar Bharaj, 11733 River Road, Surrey</u>, provided the following comments in opposition to By-law 16946:

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- There are health concerns. Breathing has been increasingly difficult over the past three years.
- So many trucks are coming and going and the amount of dust is unbearable.
- There is nowhere for the children to go that is safe; no parks, green space, etc.
- Cars and trucks drive too fast in the area.

<u>Sanyogita Faloure, 11739 River Road, Surrey</u>, provided the following comments in opposition to By-law 16946:

- The trucks speed without consideration for others.
- There are serious health concerns regarding the diesel fumes and the idling trucks for anywhere from 15 to 45 minutes.
- People have been seen pressure washing the trucks and providing oil changes and minor repairs to the trucks by way of mobile mechanics.
- Oil and diesel spill on the site which have environmental concerns.

<u>Marjorie Busse, #7 - 11860 River Road, Surrey</u>, supported the previous speakers and provided the following comments in opposition to By-law 16946:

- Concerned about the oil and debris close to that creek.
- There is a strong concern that by letting something go on illegally for a long time and then say okay down the road, it gives the wrong message; doing something wrong long enough, eventually we will make it legal.

Dwight Heinz, a representative for the Applicant, was present to provide answers to any questions and to address any concerns Council may have. The following comments were made:

- This is an opportunity to legalize the truck parking that has occurred.
- The site is zoned for business park, which will happen in the long term, however the present market conditions do not support developing a business park at this time.
- There are approximately 40 truck parking stalls on the site.
- There will be some control of the number of trucks with clearly delineated stalls that will give some order.
- With regard to the landscape buffer of 7m, there is a grade factor that has a mitigating affect.
- The north side of the property has covenants that preclude any parking which is why the back property lines (that back on to the residential properties) are used.
- Dust is another issue that will be addressed. The site will be upgraded to control the dust.
- Security will be required for the landscaping and the site use.
- A Restrictive Covenant will be required on the property to restrict the uses.
- Hours of operation can be altered to minimize impact to the neighbouring properties.

The Applicant, Mr. Sumitter Pattar, was also present and provided comments as follows:

• Much of what has been said is fabricated; I am a not a bad citizen.

- I have gone door to door in the neighbourhood and nobody has questioned or shown any concerns.
- There is a lot of landscaping at the back of the property.
- Anything that has been requested of me has been done.
- There is no garbage there.
- There are no oil changes or truck washing done on the premises, it is not environmentally right to do that.
- The dust concerns will be addressed.

<u>Mei Lai, 11769 River Road, Surrey</u>, was present to provide further opposition to By-law 16946, as follows:

- The diesel fumes, vapours and dust storms have likely been the cause of asthma, which requires medication to be available at all times.
- The constant noise at night.
- There are no parks or safe areas for children and families.
- The increased traffic speed and truck size is very dangerous.

### (c) SPINA BIFIDA AND HYDROCEPHALUS AWARENESS MONTH June, 2009

- WHEREAS Spina Bifida (a neural tube defect) is the incomplete development of the nervous system and spinal cord that occurs very early in pregnancy resulting in varying degrees of permanent paralysis, loss of sensation and bladder and bowel dysfunction; and
- WHEREAS Spina Bifida is not a progressive disorder. It is, however, a lifelong disability that cannot be outgrown; and
- WHEREAS Spina Bifida will affect one in approximately 750 children born each year in Canada; and
- WHEREAS Hydrocephalus is the accumulation of cerebrospinal fluid (CSF) within and around the brain; and
- WHEREAS over 80% of individuals with Spina Bifida have Hydrocephalus; and

WHEREAS with recent medical treatments, therapies and educational approaches individuals with Spina Bifida and/or Hydrocephalus can grow up to have healthy, fulfilling lives; and

WHEREAS recent scientific research has proven that a daily intake of 0.4 mg of the "B" vitamin, Folic Acid, can significantly reduce the occurrence of Spina Bifida by up to 75%; and

WHEREAS the Spina Bifida and Hydrocephalus Association of BC is committed to assist those with Spina Bifida and/or Hydrocephalus and their families, and to inform the public about Spina Bifida and Hydrocephalus;

"Metro Vancouver Port Cities and Port Metro Vancouver

WHEREAS the Vancouver Fraser Port Authority, known as Port Metro Vancouver, administers Canada's premier port which is a major employer and economic generator within the Metropolitan Vancouver region; and

WHEREAS port-related industries occupy a major proportion of the industrial waterfront lands within the Metropolitan Vancouver region; and

WHEREAS the Greater Vancouver Regional District, known as Metro Vancouver, includes sixteen cities that border the port (Port Cities), and that provide municipal services and access essential to the effective operation of port activities, and manage development adjacent to the port; and

WHEREAS the Port Cities, Metro Vancouver and Port Metro Vancouver are all committed to the economic development of the region, the provision of employment, the efficient movement of passengers and goods, the preservation of industrial waterfront lands and the maintenance and enhancement of the environment;

THEREFORE the Port Cities, Metro Vancouver and Port Metro Vancouver acknowledge the importance of each to the other, the necessity for a good working relationship between them, and their commitment to this Charter to guide this relationship.

- The Port Metro Vancouver and the Port Cities acknowledge the independence of each other, as well as the obligations of each to act in a manner consistent with their respective enabling legislation.
- 2. The Port Metro Vancouver and the Port Cities commit to continuing effective communication on matters of interest to both parties; including, but not limited to, timely notice to each other and consultation on physical developments, rezonings and management policies that may affect the other.
- The Port Metro Vancouver and the Port Cities commit to a coordinated process, framework and principles by which the parties can:
  - provide information to each other on matters of mutual interest
  - undertake mutual education
  - cooperate and collaborate for their mutual benefit
  - assist in cooperatively identifying common opportunities, issues and solutions
  - provide for collaborative dispute resolution processes

4, On matters requiring formal agreement between them, the Port Cities and Port Metro Vancouver agree to pursue simplified legal agreements relying on collaborative dispute resolution processes where possible.

5. The Port Cities and Port Metro Vancouver agree to work together in areas of mutual interest and, insofar as they have separate interests, obligations, policies and delegated authority, to develop plans together that recognize these differences but seek to benefit the parties as is reasonably possible.

- 6. the Charter shall be formally reviewed at least every five years.
- The parties commit to continuing the engagement framework established in the "Preliminary Engagement Framework" that took effect January 1, 2008.
- in the event of disagreement, the Port Cities and Port Metro Vancouver agree to rely on a collaborative dispute resolution procedure involving:
  - A. in the first instance, a joint review by the President and CEO of Port Metro Vancouver and the Municipal Administrator(s) of the Port City(ies) involved in the disagreement;
  - B. if the review by the President and CEO and the Municipal Administrator(s) is unsuccessful in resolving the dispute, a joint review by a committee consisting of the Mayor, two members of Council, the Municipal Administrator, the Chair of Port Metro Vancouver, two members of the Board and the President and CEO of Port Metro Vancouver; and
  - C. if this is unsuccessful, mediation or arbitration (parties determine beforehand) by an independent board, with one member appointed by each of Port Metro Vancouver, and the Municipality(ies), and the third member, who shall be the Chair, appointed by the two members.
- 9. This Charter may be amended, at any time, by the written agreement of all parties.
- 10. A party may terminate/withdraw from this Charter, by giving to the other parties:
  - at least 12 months written notice, and
  - the opportunity to discuss the matter with the other parties."

- Letter dated May 5, 2009 from Mayor Lois Jackson, Chair, Metro Vancouver Board advising that at their February 27, 2009 meeting, the Metro Vancouver Board of Directors endorsed the following resolution supporting the production of eggs from cage free hens, and encouraging member municipalities to consider adopting a similar initiative: File: 0450-01
  - "1. To encourage Metro Vancouver residents:
    - (i) as restaurants and caterers in both private and City operations, to highlight the support for and availability of certified organic, freerange eggs on their menus;

- (ii) as consumers, to request the option of purchasing certified organic, free-range eggs at retail food outlets and restaurants and, where available, choose the certified organic, free-range option;
- (iii) as wholesalers, to highlight the preference for and availability of certified organic, free-range eggs in their supply inventories; and
- (iv) as retailers, to highlight the preference for and availability of certified organic, free-range eggs in their food stores; and
- 2. That the operators and caterers of Metro Vancouver-run facilities be requested to use only certified organic, free-range or free run whole (shell) eggs; and
- 3. That a letter be written to the Provincial Government, Federal Government and the Canadian Food Inspection Agency stating that the Metro Vancouver Board opposes battery cage egg production based on the inherent cruelty of confining egg-laying hens in battery cages; and
- 4. That a letter be written to all Metro Vancouver member municipalities and the Union of BC Municipalities requesting members to adopt a similar initiative."

- 3. Council consider adopting the following "Support for Fair Trade in US Stimulus Package" resolution adopted by the Town of Halton Hills, Ontario, to allow for a level playing field in the North American market place: File: 0470-20
  - "WHEREAS the world's economy has entered into a period of slow economic growth;
  - WHEREAS governments throughout the world have introduced various stimulus packages to encourage economic growth;
  - WHEREAS the North American market for a wide variety of construction supplies and manufactured goods used in municipal infrastructure projects is highly integrated;
  - WHEREAS the United States of America is Canada's largest trading partner and a signatory of the North American Free Trade Agreement, and both countries benefit from a highly integrated market for construction

supplies and related manufactured goods used in municipal infrastructure projects;

- WHEREAS the Town of Halton Hills is supportive of Free Trade between Canada and the United States which has existed for many years;
- WHEREAS the Government of the United States of America has introduced infrastructure stimulus packages including the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA)* which includes "Buy American" provisions for steel and other manufactured products;
- WHEREAS these restrictive provisions which are contrary to the spirit of free trade will prevent Canadian companies from bidding on contracts which contain the "Buy American" provisions at the municipal and state levels in the United States since NAFTA and The General Procurement Agreement of the World Trade Organization do not nullify such provisions at those levels;
- WHEREAS Canadian stimulus infrastructure programs do not contain any restrictions on manufacturers from other countries including the United States bidding on such contracts in Canada;
- WHEREAS local Halton Hills companies may be adversely affected by these restrictions possibly leading to lay-offs and financial losses and could lead to the erosion of their overall ongoing viability;
- WHEREAS the economic outlook of local employers is a municipal interest because of the potential negative effects of business failures on local quality of life, community vibrancy and the property tax base;
- WHEREAS Canadian municipalities have the right to undertake measures to protect their local economies and quality of life;
- BE IT RESOLVED that Canadian municipalities express support for the spirit of free and fair trade between the United States and Canada and that the restrictive 'Buy American' provisions in the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act* are contrary to that spirit of free trade;
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that FCM supports the Government of Canada and the Canadian Manufacturers and Exporters in their quest to have the United States Congress reconsider and repeal 'Buy American' requirements in federal stimulus packages;
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that FCM support Canadian municipalities who choose to adopt procurement policies which favour free and fair trade by ensuring that local infrastructure projects, including environmental projects such as water and wastewater treatment projects, procure goods and materials required for the projects only from companies whose countries of origin do not impose trade restrictions against goods and materials manufactured in Canada;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that FCM ask that the US National League of Cities to also support the spirit of this resolution and the spirit of free trade, so that municipalities on both sides of the border can continue to procure supplies in the fairest and most efficient manner."
