Acting Manager, Filming & Special Events provided the following comments:

- We would like to acknowledge the students that have been working with the City on two fantastic projects.
- He will be speaking to the 2008 Cultural Capital of Canada Award and requested the students from Sullivan Heights Secondary to join him at the podium; he introduced the students: Shannon Bentz, Emily Kerr and Carlee McNeil.
- In 2008 the Department of Canadian Heritage awarded to the City of Surrey the Cultural Capital of Canada. In 2008 there were 8 projects completed, and staff worked with the School District in partnership to visually document the 2008 projects, and now a 300 photo visual report to present to the Department of Canadian Heritage.
- The partnership at Sullivan Heights Secondary was formed with the help of Marc Pelech and the three students here at the podium.
- He reviewed a slide presentation of the work that was done, and noted that there is now photo documentation of events, such as Fusion Festival and Vaisakhi Harvest of Fun Celebration and also of historical moments such as the Civic Treasures ceremonies and the Kla-how-eya canoe project.
- The professionalism of the students over the year of the project was to be commended.
- The City would like to acknowledge the students hard work and show appreciation for their dedication to the project.

The Beautification Coordinator provided the following comments:

- He provided an overview of the Traffic Wrapping Program.
- He introduced Alyssa, Kelly and Thomas some of the many students that were involved in this project.
- The program addresses the issue of graffiti in the City, it aims at reducing the incidences of graffiti and the cost of removal. In doing so enhancing the civic landscape and providing a community amenity through the display of photography and artwork.
- He reviewed a slide presentation of the work that students have done, and explained the process of the photo to the application onto a traffic cabinet.
- The City has partnered with local schools and organizations to provide the artwork and one of the key partners has been Sullivan Heights Secondary School.
- The program has reduced the incidences of graffiti in the City, developed valuable partnerships, and also provides a wonderful display of artwork throughout the City.
- To date 16 traffic cabinets are wrapped in a test project, currently there are another 35 traffic cabinets being wrapped, and by the summer of 2011 it is planned to have 150 cabinets wrapped.

Marc Pelech, Teacher/Art Director, Sullivan Heights Secondary, stated:

- He thanked the City for the opportunity to work together with the media arts students.
- Sullivan Heights has benefitted tremendously by having opportunities to work on the visual art, whether it was the murals or banners.
- Documenting the Cultural Capital over the last year resulted in 15,000 photos, and then there was the selecting of 200 final pieces for the report to Ottawa. As well photographs were provided to the for 2008/2009 Canada Day and the Holland Park opening, therefore the marketing department has 500 to 600 photographs to use unrestricted for City purposes.

Councillor Hunt, on behalf of Council and the Citizens of Surrey, expressed appreciation to Marc Pelech for his creativity and initiative for involving students in making the City a better place.

Shannon Bentz, previously a Student of Sullivan Heights Secondary said thank you to City staff and the City for allowing students to be involved; and, she thanked Mr. Pelech for the endless hours that he provided and also for being a true role model and motivator.

Carlee McNeil, Student responded to questions, she stated: that the pictures wrap the whole of the traffic cabinet; the pictures were taken with a DSLR camera and sectioned appropriately; the technical process involves a external contractor to print the photograph onto vinyl laminate and the laminated is then adhered to the boxes; the laminate does not require paint thinner to remove graffiti; it was suggested by the student that there be more workshops to develop good leaders who are motivators, and that can inspire others.

Councillor Rasode congratulated those involved in the projects and expressed appreciation for the great work.

Councillor Hepner noted that Marc Pelech has received the Premier's Award for Teaching Excellence, and also the Prime Minister's Award for Teaching Excellence.

Marc Pelech thanked Mayor and Council for their support to him and his students, and noted that he does feel much support from the City.

Councillor Bose congratulated Marc Pelech for his achievements in the last 20 years.

Councillor Steele congratulated Marc Pelech and the students and noted that the banners to be displayed during the Olympics are remarkable pieces of art.

Mayor and Council presented award certificates to the students and Marc Pelech on behalf of Sullivan Heights Secondary School and the students of the school. Darryl McCarron, Marketing & Communications Manager, Parks, Recreation & Culture and Robyn Cowie, Right to Play Coordinator were in attendance before Council to make a presentation regarding the "Right to Play".

The Marketing & Community Manager provided the following comments:

- He is the project manager for the 'Right to Play' and he will introduce the other colleagues in attendance.
- A video was provided for Council's perusal. The video was prepared in May when the initial partnership developed with Right to Play and the goal was to use the video to present to the schools to encourage them to sign up and join the challenge, as it is a voluntary program in the school system.
- There was a launch of the project at the Surrey Sports and Leisure Complex with at least a dozen of Olympians present, and from there schools were signed up to participate in the program. The goal was to get the students to think globally, set goals for global citizenry and to make a difference coming into the games. It is about getting into the 2010 spirit, making it relevant for youth and inspiring youth along the way.
- The program ties in with the "future lives here" messaging, which means a city of families and a city that is looking to the future.
- A big focus of the program is social responsibility, helping others, thinking globally, inspiring youth and building on the existing programs within Parks and Recreation for active living, fair play, equal access and engaging youth.
- Bringing Olympians to schools was all about inspiring dreams and getting people excited about setting goals. There is supporting fundraising that is ongoing as a part of the Right to Play program to support their programs internationally.
- He introduce Robyn Cowie as a former member of the Canadian Freestyle Ski Team, she has worked internationally in the field of helping disadvantaged people around the world through the sport for development model, she knows the Right to Play philosophy and she is now devoted to Surrey's 2010 Challenge program and is the Right to Play's local representative.

Robyn Cowie, Right to Play (RTP) Coordinator provided the following comments:

- Right to Play is a humanitarian organization that is working in 23 countries around the world, such as Africa, the Middle East, Asia and most recently in Peru.
- Internationally RTP uses sport and play programs to educate children on child development and life skills, such as cooperation and leadership. RTP also uses sport and play as a way of health promotion and disease prevention; in some

cases use sport and games as a way to teach children about important health issues, such as HIV/AIDS, malaria and tuberculosis, and as a means of conflict resolution and peace education.

- RTP works in refugee camps and has used programs for rehabilitating former child soldiers. Sport and play is also used as a means of community development.
- The Canadian program emphasizes the value of sport and play for children and the power of sport as a tool for social development. RTP representatives are trained to inspire kids to stay more active and become global citizens, to empower them to make a difference in their communities and in their global communities.
- She noted that she had recently taken part, with an Olympic Athlete, in the Surrey School Program where they went into the schools and talked to the students about the important values of sport and play, such as teamwork, fair play, hope, inclusivity, cooperation, and goal setting. At the end of each session we left the students with the symbolic red ball in scripted with "look after yourself and look after one another", expressing the importance of staying healthy and active, participating in the activities available in Surrey.
- She said thank you for letting her be part of the project.

The Marketing & Community Manager noted:

- Robyn Cowie is now working out of the Community Development section of Parks and Recreation, devoted to the 2010 Challenge Program through to games time.
- The program has reached 131 schools and 70,000 students; this includes private schools, public schools, independent schools and learning centres. The program is an unprecedented pre-Olympic program.
- The program is at the beginning stages and has already raised \$30,000 dollars through the school efforts and other public events.
- Schools are now looking at their own projects and they will be working right through to the games doing various initiatives, including such things as skatea-thons, swim-a-thons, anything that is active or a 2010 theme-related event.
- Staff is also building awareness of the program in the community.

Councillor Hepner noted that the program is the biggest program in the nation that reaches many children with direct contact with Olympians, and it is a significant accomplishment to be teaching children leadership, global citizenry, and active healthy living. RTP has had a presence in Surrey for some years in the inter-city schools and therefore we are advantaging our own children with the program of RTP.

Councillor Martin congratulated the efforts of the RTP.

Councillor Rasode thanked all the staff that have worked on this initiative, including Councillor Hepner and the 2010 Committee, and noted that one of the important things that has emerged from the program is community engagement.

Mayor Watts thanked the staff for the work done on this initiative.

The last update on the program was provided by way of Corporate Report No. R148 that was considered by Council at its Regular meeting on July 27th, 2009.

Allen Aubert & John Sprung Launch of the International Design Competition File: 6430-01; 0550-20-10

Allen Aubert, Architect; John Sprung, Educator at Kwantlen Polytechnic University; and Scott Kemp, Architect, were in attendance before Council to officially launch the International Design Competition, to make a short presentation to outline the sites, the ideas and a brief overview of the competition.

Allen Aubert, provided the following comments:

- The members of the Competition Organizing Committee are:
 - Scott Kemp, MAIBC, Architect, and competition professional advisory.
 - John Sprung, Educator at Kwantlen Polytechnic University and responsible for the competition documentation.
 - Jean Lamontagne, General Manager, Planning and Development, competition over sight.

- o Allan Aubert, MAIBC, Architect, and the competition coordinator.
- Trevor Boody and Sean Ruthen, Architects could not be present this evening due to prior engagements.
- He thanked City Staff for the hard worked they have provided on short notice.
- The competition website is almost ready to go live, and to invite the competition designers to take part.
- An approved process has been created to hold an ideas design competition for each of Surrey's 5 town centres.
- A competition that will result in new ideas coming forward that should start the process of looking at and thinking about the future for each town centre by creating a 'sense of place' that incorporates the principles of sustainability.
- An ideas competition that will act as a platform for community dialogue to create energy, synergy and result in action.
- This ideas competition is open to all anywhere in the world and this competition is digital through the internet, and aims to seek the very best ideas.
- Each town centre presents a difference challenge and opportunity for designers (Cloverdale – Roundup; Fleetwood – Marker; Guildford – Cornered; Newton – New Town; and Semiahmoo – Up).
- The competition will be of interest to designers everywhere faced with the challenge of urban sprawl and where town centre are losing or lost their identity and 'sense of place'. The ideas generated will be transferable and will have value beyond Surrey's borders.
- Surrey is leading the way with this ambitious ideas competition, with a scope not attempted anywhere on such a large scale at one time.
- Surrey Central City is not part of the competition as it is well advanced in its planning and new plans are being advanced to shape its future identity.
- The competition design process and submissions will be anonymous and monitored by the competition professional advisor.
- The following requirements are necessary to make the design competition:
 - Mayor and Council have approved moving forward.
 - An experienced organizing committee must be selected and retained.
 - An experienced and well respected professional jury must be identified and retained.
 - A professional advisor must be selected and retained to ensure the competition is approved by the AIBC and that the competition rules are strictly followed.
 - City staff resources must be identified and selected.
 - Experienced and skilled consultants must be retained to create the competition brand, identity and to build the web site that will provide the tools for designers to work with.
- The key milestones going forward are:
 - Competition registration on line starts November 5, 2009;

- Competition entries due January 6, 2010;
- Competition jury meets January 17, and 18, 2010 hosted by Kwantlen Polytechnic University;
- Exhibition of entries February 4 to February 23, 2010 hosted by Surrey SFU;
- Award winners announced by Mayor and Council February 24, 2010 at Surrey SFU; and,
- Public panel convened with winning designers and representatives of development industry March, 2010 themed "Where do we go from here? Celebrate and honours the City's past, and have courage to build for the future."

Scott Kemp stated his role on the Competition Organizing Committee is as the professional advisor; therefore it is his duty to ensure the competition is run in compliance with the AIBC rules governing competitions. For instance that all participants are treated fairly and equitably and comply with the rules of the competition. He also stated that:

- Judging will be done based on merit and done anonymously.
- There are two different type of competitions, the first is a competition that would choose an architect for a direct commission and would only be opened to BC registered architects; the second type of competition (such as Townshift competition) is an open ideas competition, the same rules apply, however it is structured slightly different, there is a more freedom and latitude to organize the competition and anyone anywhere can participate in this competition.
- There is no direct commission as part of ideas competition, however the ideas and the dialogue that is generated is intended to make its way into the built environment.
- All the rules of the Townshift competition have been reviewed by the AIBC and they are in compliance with AIBC regulations.
- AIBC is enthusiastically supporting the competition and is encouraging all its members to make submission.

John Sprung stated that:

- the competition is digital and will start on November 5, 2009 when the website opens for registration and will run until January 4, 2010.
- Townshift has 2 other components to its name, officially it is known as Townshift – suburb into city; and it is also known as an ideas competition for Surrey's town centres
- Publicity will note that the competition "is a City of Surrey initiative".
- He reviewed the animation of the Townshift website and noted that there are five competitions in one; the five different sites are being used to exemplify difference characteristic and issues as what has to be addressed as a suburb grows into a higher density urban environment.
- The five sites have been picked as a challenge to the international entrance to exemplify specific areas, (Cloverdale Roundup; Fleetwood Marker;

Guildford – Cornered; Newton – New Town; and Semiahmoo – Up) the requirements here can be transferred both within the City and, more importantly, these issues are being dealt with in every suburb in the world, and therefore we expect the results of this competition will transfer to other cities as well.

- The International Jury, where selection will take place, will consist of the following: David Miller, FAIA, Miller-Hull Partnership, Seattle, WA; Stephen Teeple, OAA, FRAIC, Teeple Architects, Toronto; Jane Durante, FCSLA, Durante-Kreuk Landscape Architects, Vancouver; Peter Webb, B. Arch, Concord Pacific Development, Vancouver; and, Mary Beth Rondeau, MAIBC, City of Surrey.
- The milestones of the competition are: November, 5 Registration opens; January 6 – Entries are due; January 17 – Jury meets; February 4 – Exhibition opens; February 24 – Awards announced (there will be a total of \$75,000 dollars in prizes awarded); and in March – Public panels "Where do we go from here?"
- At the end of this there will be a publication that will become a reference for years to come, and as well the website will have posted all entries for future references.

- ICBC is working in partnership with the City of Surrey through the Crime Reduction Strategy as part of mutual commitment to crime reduction initiatives.
- Today ICBC has officially launched the operation lock up program here in Surrey and would like to present to Mayor and Council a steering wheel lock to kick off the project.
- Owners of older vehicles who are at risk of crime are eligible to receive a free steering wheel lock as outlined in the Crime Prevention Week Corporate report.
- The program is a partnership between the Surrey RCMP, City of Surrey, Crime Prevention Society, White Rock RCMP and ICBC.
- We encourage all resident to help combat auto theft and lock up.

Jacki Tokaryk presented the steering wheel lock to Council.

CIVIC ADDRESS:	15200, 15210 (also shown as 15220), 15230 and 15340 (shown as 15340 to 15370) - Guildford Dr.
APPLICANT:	Cardiff Properties Ltd. and Owners of Strata Plan LMS2768 Phase 1 and Phase 2 c/o Jim Ellis #201, 4695 Hastings Street Burnaby, BC V5C 2K6
PROPOSAL:	To rezone the site from "Comprehensive Development Zone (CD)" (By-law No. 12503, as amended) to "Comprehensive Development Zone (CD)" (By-law No. 17032).
	The purpose of the rezoning is to facilitate the subdivision of remnant lot A into 2 separate lots, update the zoning with new standards to permit future multiple residential development.

The Notice of the Public Hearing was read by the City Clerk. The location of the property was indicated to the Public Hearing.

Mike Barbillion, 15523 – 105A Avenue, stated that:

- He is unclear as to what the nature of the development will be aside from it being multiple residential.
- He had spoke at a previous meeting regarding the adjacent property and there were issues brought forward regarding the corner at 154 and Guildford Drive, it is a volatile traffic area and is a concern for any future consideration.
- He was asked to be a consultant on the watercourse that runs through the area and runs through the border the subject property, and he asked if there has been any consideration for easements and/or setbacks.
- He noted that he understand that in lot A there is a watercourse underground and there have been discussion of opening that watercourse as it is a salmon rearing stream.

- The property at the corner of 108/152 (boulevard development) when constructed was built upon a peat bog which retained the water and released it slowly, bur that since the development there has been flash flooding in the area.
- He hopes there will be consideration given to the ramifications of development hardening of the property, and restricting the water contribution that it gives to the river.
- Consideration should also be given to the fish and wildlife enhancement, as well as the retention of the wildlife corridor.
- Water retention is great idea and he further suggested that there should be retaining pools and an easement to allow introduction of gravel into spawning bed.

Staff advised that there is a watercourse along the southern boundary of lot B and there is already a restrictive covenant on title that restricts any development within the setback area, currently there is no development planned for lot B, the purpose of the rezoning is to allow subdivision of remaindered lot A.

Staff advised that as part of the Engineering requirements for this application the applicant will have to address the onsite detention for the remnant property.

Jim Ellis, representing the developer, Townsgate Developments and Cardiff Properties Ltd., stated:

- he was involved in the original rezoning of the property in 1997; the property is currently zoned Comprehensive Development zoning permitting the development of parcels A, B, and C into low rise multifamily residential with lot C being a high rise tower;
- this zoning was approved 10 years ago and at that time all the environmental issues were dealt with the approval of the Ministry of Environment and Department of fisheries, setbacks were determined and adhered to and chain link fences were installed, in addition to that there was off site work done in North Surrey as mitigation for the 15 meter setback from top of bank;
- the outfall for the Guildford Mall parking lot is at the cul-de-sac at 153 and this is all being surveyed by the environmental biologist and surveys were all done as part of a multi phase development that was to be three buildings;
- the first two buildings were built, there was a delay in the construction and it was decided in conjunction with the existing strata owners that the future development would be a separate strata; and
- The development will be built as per the original development permit it will not be part of the existing strata, a new strata corporation will be developed to manage the day to day operations, to separate the stratas there was a requirement to legally subdivide the property. The subdivision is the essence of the comprehensive development bylaw that is before Council, to permit the remainder of lot A to be legally separated from the first two phases. The densities the area of the buildings has remained unchanged.
