APPLICANT:	Didar and Ravinder Bains c/o Hunter Laird Engineering Ltd. (Clarence Arychuk) #300, 65 Richmond Street New Westminster, BC V3L 5P5
PURPOSE:	The applicant is requesting to amend the Official Community Plan to allow a Temporary Industrial Use Permit on the hatched site. This permit will allow continued operation of an existing truck park facility to accommodate a maximum of 56 tractor trailers for a period not to exceed three (3) years. The applicant will be working toward a long-term permanent solution which includes redeveloping the subject property into business park buildings.

Note: See Temporary Industrial Use Permit No. 7909-0188-00 under Item I.3(a).

The Notice of the Public Hearing was read by the City Clerk. The location of the property was indicated to the Public Hearing.

<u>J. Dosanjh, 153 Street & 68 Avenue</u>: The delegation expressed concern regarding the following: 1) large truck parking 2) dust/pollution, noise, and 3) increased traffic associated with the proposed Temporary Use Permit (TUP).

Councillor Hepner requested clarification regarding where the delegation resides in relation to the TUP. Staff, in response clarified that the delegation lives on the fronting property adjacent to 60 Avenue.

Staff clarified that the current application before Council tonight is a TUP and it is Council's first look at the application (although it is a 2009 application). The application next door is a new TUP that will be brought forward shortly; the application to the south is involved with the City as a land exchange.

Councillor Gill asked what site improvements are being proposed to control the dust. Staff, in response noted that the applicant is proposing a paved apron for the access way and there will be material placed in the parking way that will be dust-free (yet to be determined). Other enhancements include, fencing and landscaping and fencing for the fishery/water courses on site.

Councillor Hayne asked staff why there is a speed bump located in land that is designated as industrial. Staff noted that a request had been made for the speed bump previously to aid in traffic calming as there have been issues with speeding previously.

<u>H. Balzer, 6788 - 152 Street (Relate Church)</u>: The delegation expressed concern regarding the following: 1) parking, 2) safety, 3) truck traffic, and 4) narrowness of the road and noted that there is jay-walking that occurs in the area and there are large trucks turning and it is a potential for a severe accident.

<u>C. Arychuk, Hunter Laird Engineering Ltd. (on behalf of the Applicant)</u>: The site is already operating as a truck parking site, part of the site around the house is already paved. The applicant will be installing a paved driveway and are working on a redesign on the site and anticipate it will be paved by March 2014. There are a number of parking facilities in the area and with the improvements the site will become even better. Since 2009, there were a number of city requirements, one of the complications was that a "green coded ditch" has now been "yellow coded"; as a result, the Applicant is awaiting answers from the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) on that and it is taking a while to resolve.

Councillor Gill asked for clarification regarding the 3-year delay in the application. The delegation noted that based on comments/requirements from City staff there are items that could not be provided by his clients when the initial application was put forward and that his applicants had planned on withdrawing their application. It was difficult to get the two parties to agree to a road alignment and the road will not be built until the next level of development. The applicants do not have the funding to put in the millions required for the business development facilities for a business park; the owners have now come up with a plan to resolve the issues.

The delegation noted that the Applicants have not been contacted by Relate Church and that this is the first they have heard of any concerns.
