B. DELEGATIONS - PUBLIC HEARING

Surrey Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 18452 Application: 7915-0033-00	
CIVIC ADDRESS:	5948 and 5956 – 184 Street
APPLICANT:	City of Surrey c/o City of Surrey, Realty Services Div. (Avril Wright)
PURPOSE:	The applicant is seeking to rezone the site from Local Commercial to Single Family Residential (12). The applicant is proposing to subdivide the site into 5 single family small lots.

The Notice of the Public Hearing was read by the City Clerk. The location of the property was indicated to the Public Hearing.

<u>P. Singh, President, Guru Teg Bahadur Welfare Society</u>: The delegation expressed the following concerns: 1) privacy for temple users and new proposed homes,
2) early morning Gurdwara services and potential impact of residents, and
3) potential noise and safety issues regarding traffic.

<u>Concerned Resident</u>: The delegation expressed concern regarding the following: 1) potential congestion due to temple services and impact on-street parking, 2) lack of parking for new residents, 3) potential negative impact on green-space associated with the proposed development, and 4) that the proposed development site is acting as a buffer zone between the temple and local residents.

<u>W. Duccett, 63 Avenue & 189 Street</u>: The delegation suggested that the proposed site be turned into a park.

<u>Concerned Resident</u>: The delegation expressed the following concerns: 1) having houses back-to-back with the Gurdwara, and 2) requested Council to reconsider the application before any conclusions are reached.

Council requested clarification as to whether the Gurdwara had expressed interested in acquiring the property and noted that if the City can assist in the creation of a park, something can explored. <u>Concerned Resident</u>: The delegation expressed the following concerns: 1) there is an area needed for children and benches are needed for seniors, 2) there should be privacy between the place of worship and the residents, a buffer zone is needed, and 3) the Gurdwara will assist in the creation of a park.
