1. Anna Mathewson, Manager, Sustainability, and Renate Stitch, Program Manager – Training and Education, BC Sustainable Energy Association, Climate Change Showdown – School Award and Student Award File: 0290-20; 0550-20-10

In attendance before Council to announce the 2015 Climate Change Showdown School and Student Awards.

The following comments were made:

- The delegation provided an overview of the program under the BC Sustainable Energy Association and is geared to teaching elementary students about climate change and that the program operates in a workshop setting with participating classrooms watching a 20-minute video narrated by Rick Mercer, playing a board game that is educational, and there is a take home contest component where students can work with their families to complete various actions.
- The City of Surrey has sponsored the program through School District #36 over the past 6 years and the program is closely aligned with the City of Surrey Energy Emissions plan. The results from 2014 / 2015 are impressive with 35 workshops that reached 933 students in Surrey School District (Grades 4-7) with a measured GHG Savings of 548 tonnes (3,298 t since 2009).
- There were three close runners up: Cathy Rosenthal's class from Boundary Park Elementary and Erica Segec and Megan Birdsall's classes from Bonaccord Elementary.
- The top class in Surrey was Walnut Road Elementary Cheryl Gosse and Jenn Zdril's Grade 4 class.

Mayor and Council presented students with certificates for participating in the program and undertaking individual initiatives.

The Notice of the Public Hearing was read by the City Clerk. The location of the property was indicated to the Public Hearing.

<u>C. Baca, 153 Street & 101 Avenue</u>: The delegation expressed the following concerns 1) densification associated with the proposed project, 2) community amenities associated with the development are unclear, 3) current infrastructure does not support proposed capacity, and 4) potential overcrowding of local school.

M. Schelp, 153 Street & 101 Avenue: The delegation expressed the following concerns: 1) proposed application is not in keeping with neighbourhood context, and 2) potential traffic congestion associated with increased density.

L. Shen, 153 Street & 101 Avenue: The delegation expressed the following concerns:

- 1) the size and scale of the development, 2) lack of on street parking, and
- 3) additional construction.

Council requested clarification from the delegation regarding the number of individuals residing in his strata complex. In response the delegation noted that there are 350 residents residing in the complex which is comprised of 4 four-storey buildings. Staff clarified that parking will be available in the on-site parkade and as well as on street.

<u>Concerned Resident</u>: The delegation expressed concern regarding light pollution associated with the proposed project.

<u>Concerned Resident</u>: The delegation expressed the following concerns: 1) density of the development, 2) the building form is not within the neighbourhood context, 3) potential lack of communication regarding townhouse and apartment residents.

M. Dembek, Barnett Dembek Architects Inc. (on behalf of the Applicant): The Architect made the following comments: 1) Visitor parking will be located below grade, 2) conflicts between apartments and townhouse owners should be minimal because they are located within the same building and are essentially among the same user group, 3) the block is currently under density as it exists now in an area that is zoned for multi-family housing, the developer is proposing a density of 2.40 FAR, which is higher; however, given the way that Surrey is growing there is a push for more density, 4) the developer will be providing an amenity contribution that is yet to be worked out with staff, 5) the building to the south is 4 storeys and the building to the north of the block is 4 stories. The proposed application is 5 stories and they are trying to work within that context and have deliberately included an extensive cornice on the 4th storey level. Moving back across the street, the 5th floor is setback to give it a perceived difference in the top floor to accommodate neighbours, the massing has been broken into two smaller components, to reduce the scale, 6) any shadows cast by the building will fall to the north, the neighbours on the north are 1 block away and should have minimal shadow casting, and 7) there will be one bedroom apartments and 2 -3 bedroom townhouse units to give a variety of building forms to the area.

Councillor Hayne asked for clarification regarding what the finished block on either side of the development would look like. The Architect noted that there are two lots on either side that would fill in (potentially) and become another apartment building. Another item that the Applicant undertook is to provide a knock out wall on the building ramp to provide access to the four lots on the east of the site.

Mayor Hepner requested clarification regarding access and egress from vehicles and how light pollution would be mitigated. The Architect noted that it is possible to work with the concerned resident to provide plantings to offer screening.

Councillor Villeneuve asked for clarification regarding School Board comments received in response to the proposed project. Staff, in response noted that both the high school and elementary schools have the capacity at this time to accommodate the forecasted number of students.
